This publication implements the Hunting, Fishing, and Boating Program. It provides guidance and procedures to all persons eligible to hunt, fish, or boat (hereafter, participate) on Joint Base Langley Eustis-Eustis (JBLE-E). This publication may be supplemented at any level, but all supplements must be routed to the Office of Primary Responsibility (OPR) listed above for coordination prior to certification and approval. Refer recommended changes and questions about this publication to the OPR listed above using the Air Force (AF) Form 847, Recommendation for Change of Publication; route AF Forms 847 from the field through the appropriate chain of command. Ensure that all records created as a result of processes prescribed in this publication are maintained in accordance with Air Force Manual 33-363, Management of Records, and disposed of IAW Air Force Records Information Management System, Records Disposition Schedule. The use of the name or mark of any specific manufacturer, commercial product, commodity, or service in this publication does not imply endorsement by the AF.

SUMMARY OF CHANGES

The 2023 annual review resulted in administrative changes associated with the arrival of two US Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) Conservation Law Enforcement Officers (CLEOs):

- Section 1.9 was updated to acknowledge the inclusion of US Fish and Wildlife Service Conservation Law Enforcement Officers
- Table 1 was created to describe Ft Eustis specific offenses and associated penalties.
- Section 2.6.1.3 allows hunters to be within 100 yards from marked tree only during early archery season.
- Chapter 5 was updated to incorporate duties and responsibilities of CLEOs. 733d CEF is tasked in the document as the primary for search/rescue and emergency recovery for recreation mishaps.
- Chapter 6 was updated to describe Conservation Law Enforcement roles and responsibilities in addition to 733d SFS.
- Appendix A now includes administrative actions for penalties and violations.
- Additional administrative items were updated as applicable: iSportsman account holders were limited to one account per person. Certain penalties were reduced to administrative actions for enforcement. Urban archery deer seasons were removed from the document as current DWR regulations do not allow urban archery seasons in our locality.

Chapter 1

GENERAL INFORMATION

1.1. Purpose. This instruction prescribes policies and procedures for hunting, fishing and boating on JBLE-E.

1.2. Applicability. The requirements in this instruction apply to all persons participating in the Hunting, Fishing, and Boating Programs at Joint Base Langley-Eustis, Fort Eustis only. Active duty military and dependents, federal employees, retired military personnel, retired federal employees, and non-affiliated civilians are authorized to recreate on JBLE-E.

1.3. Explanation of Acronyms and Terms. Abbreviations and special terms used in this policy are explained in Appendix A.

1.4. Federal and State Laws. All persons participating in the Hunting, Fishing, and Boating Program will comply with Federal and State wildlife laws, as well as installation policies and will cooperate fully with representatives of law enforcement agencies.

1.5. iSportsman Portal. The iSportsman Portal (jble.isportsman.net) is used to manage all hunting, fishing, and boating activities at Fort Eustis. All participants must register in iSportsman and acquire relevant permits before participating in these activities. Users are limited to one iSportsman account per person. All users other than youth participants are required to provide contact phone number, vehicle information, and emergency contact information and all participants accessing the base with personal vehicles are required to provide vehicle information including license plate number. Participants are also required to check-in, check-out while recreating and provide all requested contact, license, and harvest data. Participants must also monitor the iSportsman Portal for current information, recreation availability, and notifications. All recreation participants are encouraged to read and become familiar with the information in this Instruction and iSportsman.

1.6. Land Management. JBLE-E lands are managed for military missions. Primary consideration is given to accomplishing military requirements, such as training and providing supporting infrastructure.

1.7. Integrated Natural Resources Management (INRMP). All hunting, fishing, and boating activities are subject to the 633 Installation Commander's natural resource management policies and procedures as articulated in the JBLE-Eustis Integrated Natural Resource Management Plan (INRMP), including both game and non-game wildlife, and other flora and fauna. The INRMP is reviewed/updated annually with complete revision made every five years to accommodate for

changes resulting from regulatory requirements, mission changes, or changes affecting wildlife populations and habitat conditions. The INRMP can be accessed on the Fort Eustis Environmental website.

1.8. Access and Parking. All training areas and firebreaks are off-limits except for military training or other activities permitted by this or other installation regulations. Parking is prohibited in front of yellow gates or areas along a road painted with yellow hash marks, as these are designated fire and emergency zones. All parking shall be in normally authorized parking areas, parking areas designated on hunting maps posted on iSportsman, and any location where hunter or watercraft launch signs are posted.

1.9. Enforcement. Conservation law enforcement is executed by Unites States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) Conservation Law Enforcement Officers (CLEO) in coordination with 733d Security Forces Squadron (SFS) to protect against unauthorized habitat disturbance, illegal "take", damage to property and facilities, vandalism, illegal removal of archeological resources and to ensure public safety. Conservation law enforcement personnel are authorized to enforce Federal, State, and local conservation and wildlife laws, AF regulations, and installation policies.

1.10. Prohibited Activities. This policy prohibits the following activities. See subsequent sections for additional activity-specific prohibitions.

1.10.1. Possession or use of alcohol, illegal drugs or medication causing mental or physical impairment while recreating on the Installation.

1.10.2. Any unsafe act or misuse of weapons so as to endanger life, limb, or property. The firing range is the only authorized location for shooting or discharging firearms. Recreational shooting is permitted on the designated personal firearms range (Range 3) during weekends by 733 Force Support Squadron. Archery tackle (traditional, compound, and crossbows) is permitted only at the designated archery range located off of Mulberry Island Road.

1.10.3. Introducing plants or releasing any animal, including game or non-game wildlife, birds, fish, insects, other organisms, or their parts, onto the installation, except as authorized by 733d Civil Engineering Squadron (CES). The introduction of plants does not encompass ornamental plantings in housing areas or containerized plants in living or working spaces.

1.10.4. Take of game outside of defined seasons and take of non-game wildlife species not covered under this policy. Collecting or attempting to collect any wildlife carcass or parts

other than those legally harvested under this policy to include (but not limited to) shed antlers, skulls, feathers, claws, talons, beaks, furs, turtle shells, etc.

1.10.5. Utilizing filming equipment or posting of material on social media or other internet forums from within ranges or training areas. Utilization of wildlife cameras or remote camera/sensing equipment for any purpose is not authorized by the Installation Commander.

1.10.6. Removing forest products (such as tree limbs, tree trunks, slash, downed timber, standing timber, pine straw, soils, etc.) without appropriate approval and coordination of 733d CES. For example, cutting tree limbs to apply to a duck blind for camouflage is an example of prohibited forest product removal.

1.10.7. Removing or attempting to locate (such as metal detectors or digging) or remove archeological resources, artifacts, markers, signs, digging or ground disturbance, and/or altering or defacing informational and regulatory signs or maps.

1.10.8. Engaging in or attempting to engage in habitat modifying activities such as altering surface water, wetlands, forest or other habitats without appropriate approval and coordination through 733d CES. Examples of modifications may include (but not limited to) cutting trees, removing downed timber, placement/discharge of vegetation debris or other materials into wetlands, excavating in wetlands, trimming of vegetation, painting of trees, use of pesticides, and utilization of permanent bark penetrating devices.

1.10.9. Entering any training area or other areas, except designated public access areas, without coordination of Range Operations and 733d SFS. Entry into any area by persons engaged in activities must be signed in through iSportsman. Game recovery and volunteer work activities must be approved and coordinated through 733d CES at all times.

1.10.10. Harassment of military personnel conducting training operations, government employees or contractors employed by the installation, or harassment of personnel authorized to recreate in a given area (except to provide notice for avoidance and safety), or intentionally interfering with the lawful pursuit of game species.

1.10.11. Littering or disposing of refuse, except in approved receptacles.

1.10.12. Open air fires or burning of refuse.

1.10.13. Using motorcycles, dirt bikes, three or four wheeled all-terrain vehicles (ATVs), utility terrain vehicles (UTVs), or other motorized off-road vehicles while hunting and

fishing. Operating motor vehicles on any terrain except existing improved or semi-improved roads.

1.10.14. Possession of night vision devices (i.e., Forward Looking Infrared (FLIR) and Night Vision) while hunting.

1.10.15. Use of vinyl flagging or reflective markers.

1.10.16. Reserving recreational areas for the prevention of use by others.

1.10.17. Providing false information during harvest data collection processes or iSportsman registration, checkin or checkout procedures. It is unlawful to damage or mutilate animal carcasses so as to obscure biological or physical characteristics of any fish, bird or other animal or withhold or provide incorrect information in the iSportsman portal.

1.10.18. Engaging wildlife species by activities or vocalizations that interfere with the species biological processes or increases metabolic energy requirements, except while actively engaged in hunting is prohibited unless approved by the Wildlife Biologist.

1.10.19. Recreational trapping is prohibited.

1.10.20. Use of electronic calls is prohibits IAW DWR regulations, except while predator hunting.

1.11. Unexploded Ordinance (UXO). Persons permitted for recreation activities may encounter UXO (bullets, bombs, rockets, flares, etc.) in the areas that are open to public recreation. Their size, sensitivity and explosive fill are unknown. Handling, (kicking, impacting; picking one up) could have a critical/catastrophic consequence and all UXOs will be avoided. UXOs may be on the surface, partially buried or completely buried. All persons encountering a suspected UXO shall contact Fire & Emergency Services (FSS) by calling 911 and notify the dispatch they are on Fort Eustis.

1.12. License Requirements. License requirements are set by federal, state, and local entities and are required in addition to Installation permits explained in section 1.12 of this policy.

1.12.1. All persons 12 years of age and over must have valid installation permit(s) for each recreation activity while participating in such activities.

1.12.2. All persons must possess appropriate federal, and state permits and registrations to include, but not limited to, Virginia Department of Wildlife Resources (DWR) licenses, Federal Migratory Duck Stamp, Virginia Migratory Waterfowl Conservation Stamp, Harvest Information Program (HIP) registration, and State recognized boater safety course. Possession of Federal, State, and Local permits and training completion documentation (i.e. boater and hunter safety courses) must be acknowledged in the iSportsman platform before acquiring Installation permits.

1.12.3. All persons must view required safety briefs and pass all safety surveys in the iSportsman platform before acquiring Installation permits. All Installation permits must be acquired through the iSportsman platform.

1.13. Permit Fees. All permit fees are determined and modified annually by 733d CES to offset the costs associated with operating the recreation programs described in this policy and without re-approval of this document.

1.13.1. Permit schedules are annual from the date of purchase for fishing and boating permits. All hunting permits are valid 1 July through 30 June. All permits must be purchased through the iSportsman portal.

1.13.2. Permit fees are reviewed annually and posted on the iSportsman portal.

1.13.3. A general hunting, combination, or youth permit is required for hunting on JBLE-E. All persons wishing to hunt during early archery or muzzleloader season(s) must purchase those permits in addition if the person is to participate in those opportunities.

1.13.4. Combination permits are valid for all hunting, fishing, and boating activities except spring gobbler (wild turkey) and deer management lotteries.

1.13.5. All persons wishing to participate in urban deer management lottery hunts (excluding impact areas hunts) must pass an archery qualification before acquiring an urban deer management permit. The permit is valid for 2 years from date of purchase. Qualification dates and times are listed on the iSportsman portal.

1.13.6. Impact Area Management Lotteries are valid for one (1) full hunt day each, and do not require qualification.

1.13.7. Refunds will not be issued for permits sold through iSportsman. If a participant is disqualified by order of the Installation Commander (base closure, pandemic, security

purposes, etc), their permit fees may be applied to future permits or lottery entries. If a participant's privileges are suspended or revoked, permits fees are forfeited.

1.14. Weapon Registration and Transport.

1.14.1. All weapons, to include firearms, muzzleloaders, air rifles, bows and crossbows, must be registered with 733d SFS, utilizing AF Form 1314.

1.14.2. Personally owned weapon owners must display printed firearms authorization paperwork on the driver's side windshield while in transit or hunting.

1.14.3. Weapons shall be cased and inaccessible while in transit with ammunition stored separately. Weapons shall not be left unattended.

Chapter 2

HUNTING

2.1. General Hunting Regulations. Persons authorized to hunt shall comply with the provisions of this instruction and adhere to all Federal, State, and local laws and regulations, JBLE-E INRMP, DoD, AF, and installation regulations governing hunting.

2.1.1. All persons 12 years of age and over must have in their possession a valid Installation permit while participating in such activities.

2.1.2. All persons issued an Installation permit are required to read, acknowledge, and follow all safety briefs and surveys required in the iSportsman platform.

2.1.3. Carrying or climbing with a loaded weapon (including a shotgun with a shell in chamber or magazine, muzzle loading firearms with primer or cap in place, or bow/crossbow with the arrow/bolt nocked/loaded on the ground) is prohibited. Weapons must remain unloaded until hunter is secured within the stand.

2.1.4. Discharge of weapons from the ground is prohibited without prior approval from 733d CES or USFWS CLEO. Handicap hunters who have been approved by the Wildlife Biologist may discharge a firearm from the ground only at approved locations that will be identified prior to hunting. Using muzzleloader primers to clean a breech is permitted provided that the firearm is free from propellant and projectile. Discharging a bolt to disarm a crossbow is permitted.

2.1.5. All hunters shall comply with any and all hunting regulations and directions provided within this document, posted on iSportsman, and at remote hunter check stations.

2.1.6. Shooting through or over fences, across ditches and roads is prohibited.

2.1.7. Hunters must report all harvests and unrecovered crippled animals in accordance with (IAW) installation policies listed on iSportsman. Reporting policies and survey forms shall be posted on iSportsman portal, the game processing facility and building 1409.

2.1.8. Scouting is only authorized following sanctioned volunteer work details or during times approved by Range Operations.

2.1.9. All hunters shall make a reasonable effort to retrieve the animal. All hunters shall make a reasonable attempt to retrieve injured wildlife resulting from hunting.

2.1.10. It is unlawful to harvest any animal with the use of bait, spot and stalk, jump shooting, "man-driving," or buck shot.

2.1.11. It is unlawful to install/utilize permanent tree stands, gear hangers, or other fixtures, unless provided by 733d CES.

2.1.12. Every game animal wounded by hunting and reduced to possession by the hunter shall be killed immediately and become a part of the daily bag. No person will at any time, or by any means, possess or transport live game or nongame animals, or other fauna. Hunters must notify 733d CES or CLEO prior to dispatching game animals from the ground.

2.1.13. No person shall use or direct artificial light, including automotive headlights, flashlights, or spotlights for the purpose of spotting, locating, or taking animals within the boundaries of the installation.

2.1.14. Hunters may retrieve harvested game if the game is within sight from the hunter's assigned stand. If the game is not visible, hunters must wait until the end of daily hunting periods or by contacting 733d CES or a CLEO before searching for the animal. Hunters searching for harvested deer beyond daily hunting periods must contact 733d CES or a USFWS CLEO for approval prior to going afield. Contact information is provided on the iSportsman Portal.

2.1.15. All deer must be tagged IAW Virginia DWR regulations prior to moving the animal.

2.1.16. Deer shall not be field dressed in hunting areas. Hunters shall bring all harvested deer to the Deer Processing Facility to provide required harvest data the same day the animal was harvested.

2.1.17. Hunters living off installation must dispose of wildlife carcasses off of the installation. 733 CES will provide soldiers living in base barracks with a location to dispose of harvested deer carcasses.

2.1.18. Possession or use of any product that contains natural deer urine or other bodily fluid is prohibited IAW Virginia DWR regulations.

2.1.19. Approval for handicapped hunting must be coordinated through 733d CES prior to participation.

2.2. Hunting Seasons and Days. No hunting is authorized when the installation is closed by order of the Installation Commander. Hunting seasons and days are assigned by 733d CES and are posted on the iSportsman Portal.

2.2.1. Authorized hunting days are established annually based upon military mission requirements, hunting area access, staffing requirements, game harvest limitations, and Virginia DWR regulations. General hunting seasons follow Virginia DWR regulations while special management hunts are scheduled by 733d CES.

2.2.2. Hunting hours are defined by Virginia DWR for each season. Check-in/out times are posted on the iSportsman portal.

2.2.3. Annual seasons and bag limits shall be posted on the iSportsman portal at a minimum thirty (30) days before opening of season.

2.3. Hunting with Dogs

2.3.1. Dogs may be used to retrieve waterfowl and pursue small game IAW Virginia DWR regulations during applicable hunting seasons on the installation unless otherwise prohibited by installation policies. All dogs shall be under the direct control of the hunter/owner to preclude the dog from running loose on the installation.

2.3.2. Dogs are prohibited for hunting deer on the Installation.

2.3.3. All dogs brought to JBLE must display a current rabies vaccination tag and contact information for the owner. Hunters may remove the rabies tag while actively hunting but must maintain possession of the tags while hunting. Hunting dogs must be collared at all times with owner's contact information.

2.3.4. If any dogs leave the designated hunting area, hunting will cease, and owners shall notify USFWS CLEO and Range Operations. Approval to retrieve the dogs will be granted only after coordination with Range Operations and affected military units. Persons retrieving dogs shall secure their weapon IAW section 1.14 of this instruction.

2.3.5. Dogs may be used to blood trail wounded deer. Prior to tracking, 733 CES or CLEO's must be notified. Blood trailing dog must remain in positive physical control, meaning tethered or physical leash. Electronic collars are not considered positive physical control. Blood trailing dogs are not allowed to remain in the vehicle while the hunter is afield (anticipating use of dog is not permitted).

2.4. Blaze Colored Requirements

2.4.1. Deer hunters must wear blaze orange/pink IAW Virginia DWR regulation during deer seasons at Fort Eustis.

2.4.2. Waterfowl hunters must wear blaze orange/pink when traversing to and from waterfowl hunting locations while hunting during deer seasons.

2.4.3. Small game and predator hunters must wear blaze orange/pink while hunting during deer seasons.

2.5. Youth Hunters

2.5.1. Youth hunters 12 years old and under shall be within arm's reach of a licensed adult so that the adult can take direct control of the weapon if needed.

2.5.2. Youth hunters 13-15 years old may hunt alone within 25 yards and within direct line of sight of licensed adult. If hunters utilize personal climbing stands, the adult and youth cannot cohabit the same tree. Both hunters may possess and utilize firearms except in designated youth deer hunting stands.

2.5.3. Only one weapon is authorized on designated youth stands and only the youth is authorized to utilize the weapon.

2.6. Deer Hunting

2.6.1. Deer stands. A system of marked trees/stands exist in each hunting area and are marked numerically. Hunters must sign for a single tree/stand to hunt from. A limited number of single and double metal stands exist.

2.6.1.1. Deer hunters must utilize a safety harness or tree saddle while on the stand.

2.6.1.2. All deer hunting shall occur from an elevated platform no less than ten (10) feet in height, except at approved youth, senior, handicapped locations, or special circumstances approved by 733d CES.

2.6.1.3. Hunters have the option to utilize personal climbing tree stand or tree saddles within, but not exceeding, 50 yards of the marked tree, except during early archery season when hunters may hunt within 100 yards of marked tree. All hunters must remain the minimum

hold off distances from roads and buildings in accordance with section 2.11. Stand limitations and restrictions are detailed on the Hunting Map.

2.6.1.4. Cohabitation of trees by hunters, except in double metal stands, is prohibited.

2.6.1.5. Hunters are permitted to tandem hunt within 2-person metal stands or stand locations with matching stand numbers. This activity is permitted only if both hunters wish to hunt as a team. The first hunter will check in to the location and the second hunter is added as a guest; the primary hunter is responsible for checkout and data entry for both hunters.

2.6.2 Early Archery Deer Season. Archery deer seasons follows DWR seasons and regulations.

2.6.2.1. Only archery tackle is authorized during the early archery deer season. Stand locations are marked accordingly, archery tackle may be used at any designated stands that are open for that day.

2.6.2.2. Only archery tackle is authorized within Cantonment (during any season) and tree stand locations are marked accordingly.

2.6.3. Early Muzzleloader deer season. Muzzleloader deer seasons will follow Virginia DWR seasons and regulations.

2.6.3.1. Muzzle loading firearms are defined by Virginia DWR regulation.

2.6.3.2. Hunters wishing to discharge firing caps/primers through clean muzzleloader barrels may do so at appropriate parking areas for Hunting Areas where muzzleloader use is authorized. A clean muzzleloader barrel is without shot, bullet, or powder. The discharge of the caps must be with the muzzle pointed downward, away from any building, road, vehicle, and person.

2.6.4. Impact Area Management Hunts. Management lottery hunts are offered through the iSportsman portal. Lottery tickets go on sale within 2 weeks of Impact Area hunts and winners are drawn a minimum of 3 days prior to the hunt.

2.6.4.1. Hunters must be in possession of a winning lottery ticket to participate. Each winning ticket allows one (1) full day of hunting in the Impact Area.

2.6.4.2. All daily and season bag limits and regulations apply, further information is provided in a safety brief by 733d CES prior to each hunt.

2.6.4.3. Hunters are escorted and "placed" by 733d CES staff and are not permitted to hunt freely within the Impact Area. Deer may not be recovered without the authorization of 733d CES or a CLEO.

2.6.4.4. 733 CES reserves the right to disqualify hunters from all future management lotteries due to confirmed or suspected violation of Federal, State, Local, and JBLE-E policy, or safety infraction.

2.6.5. Urban Archery Management Lottery Hunts. Management hunts are offered as a means to manage deer population in specific locations within cantonment and are offered through the iSportsman portal. Lottery tickets go on sale within 2 weeks of Urban Archery Management Lottery Hunts and winners are drawn a minimum of 3 days prior to the hunt.

2.6.5.1. Hunters wishing to participate in urban archery management lottery hunts must pass a qualification course whereas they can demonstrate the ability to place 5 out of 6 arrows/bolts in the 10 or better ring of a 3D deer target, or within a 6" diameter circle. Random distances between 5 and 35 yards will be chosen by 733d CES. Hunters may use personal range finders while qualifying. Hunters must also demonstrate safe handling and general knowledge regarding the use of archery equipment and ethical shot distances and shot placement.

2.6.5.2. Qualifications are valid for 2 years beginning the date qualified. This allows entry into all urban archery management hunts during that 2-year period.

2.6.5.3. Hunters must be in possession of a winning lottery ticket to allows one afternoon hunt.

2.6.5.4. All daily and season bag limits and regulations apply. Further information is given in a safety brief by 733d CES prior to each hunt.

2.6.5.5. Hunters are escorted and "placed" by 733d CES and are not permitted to hunt freely within the hunting area. Deer may not be recovered without the presence of 733d CES.

2.6.5.6. 733d CES reserves the right to disqualify hunters from all future management lotteries due to confirmed or suspected violation of Federal, State, Local, and JBLE-E policy, or safety infractions.

2.6.6. General Firearms Deer Season.

2.6.6.1. Legal weapons and ammunition for use during the general firearms deer season are described in section 2.10.1 of this instruction.

2.6.6.2. General firearms deer season will be IAW with Virginia DWR seasons and bag limits unless specified otherwise on iSportsman. The program manager holds the authority to restrict seasons and bag limits independent of state regulations.

2.6.6.3. Archery and muzzleloading equipment may also be utilized during the general firearms season without the purchase of the early season permits IAW Virginia DWR regulations. Archery tackle is the only hunting equipment authorized within Cantonment and any stand marked as archery only, regardless of season.

2.7. Turkey Hunting. Turkey hunting is conducted each spring through a lottery system in the iSportsman portal. Specific information will be posted in February about lottery ticket sales occurring in March each year.

2.7.1. Turkey hunters with winning lottery tickets have two (2) hunts, to harvest one (1) bearded turkey. Turkey hunters will follow Virginia DWR regulations for hunting timelines (30 min prior to sunrise until noon first half of season, and until sunset second half).

2.7.2. Scouting is not permitted for turkey hunting except observing from paved roads.

2.7.3. Authorized shot size must be IAW Virginia DWR regulations.

2.8. Small Game and Predator Hunting.

2.8.1. Predators may be harvested during the Virginia DWR defined seasons.

2.8.2. Game birds may be harvested during the Virginia DWR defined seasons, with the exception of Northern bobwhite quail.

2.8.3. Hunters wishing to small game or predator hunt during the deer season must coordinate with 733d CES prior to the day of hunting to determine if adequate hunting areas are available.

2.8.4. Use of electronic calls is prohibited, except while predator hunting.

2.8.5. Hunting small game and predators at night is prohibited at Fort Eustis. Small game and predator hunting is permitted one half (1/2) hour before sunrise to one half (1/2) hour after sunset.

2.9. Waterfowl Hunting. Waterfowl hunting seasons and bag limits will be IAW Federal and State laws. Specific installation policy is listed in this instruction.

2.9.1. Waterfowl hunting is permitted at designated locations as indicated on the Waterfowl Hunting Map in the iSportsman Portal.

2.9.2. Temporary ground blinds and/or decoys may be placed for waterfowl hunting but must be removed upon conclusion of the hunt.

2.9.3. Waterfowl hunters utilizing interior ponds may hunt anywhere within the boundary of the water feature IAW waterfowl hunting map once deer season is closed.

2.9.4. Waterfowl hunters utilizing the marker system in tidal creeks are permitted to hunt within 100 yards of posted markers once deer season is closed.

2.9.5. Waterfowl hunters must use non-toxic shot.

2.9.6. Exterior waterfowl blinds and identified waterfowl blind markers may be hunted regardless of training area occupancy.

2.9.7. If training areas are occupied by activities other than waterfowl hunting, waterfowl hunters must hunt from the blind or identified marker.

2.9.8. Waterfowl hunters may utilize kayaks or canoes to set/retrieve decoys and to retrieve harvested waterfowl at any interior waterfowl hunting location.

2.9.9. Waterfowl hunters operating boats, kayaks, canoes, etc. or wading in water features with depths greater than two (2) feet shall utilize a personal floatation device.

2.9.10. Waterfowl hunters are required to document all harvested waterfowl. Combined harvest information for hunting groups does not count towards an individual's daily harvest limits.

2.10. Weapons and Ammunition

2.10.1. Authorized Weapons and Ammunition for Deer Hunting.

a. Shotguns .410 gauge through 10 gauge bore firing slugs.

b. Muzzle loading rifles and muskets .45 caliber and larger, firing a single projectile.

c. Bows and crossbows with broad heads measuring no less than 7/8" in diameter and draw weight of no less than 40lbs. Broad heads may be fixed-blade or mechanical.

- 2.10.2. Authorized Weapons and Ammunition for Migratory Game Bird Hunting.
 - a. Shotguns .410 gauge through 10 gauge bore.

b. Shot sizes and type restrictions shall be IAW federal and state regulations.

c. Auto loading shotguns capable of holding more than three shells must be plugged with a one-piece filler plug inserted inside the magazine in such a way the plug may not be removed without disassembly of the shotgun.d. Nontoxic shot is required for hunting migratory waterfowl.

2.10.3. Authorized Weapons and Ammunition for Small Game and Predator Hunting.a. Shotguns .410 gauge through 10 gauge bore. Shot sizes larger than #4 are prohibited.

b. Air rifles not exceeding .22 caliber are authorized. Air rifle use is prohibited within 200 yards of any structure or paved road. Air rifle use is limited to designated locations, to include Hunting Area 24I, Hunting Area 28 (see hunting map for specifics), Hunting Area 24 west of the train tracks.

- 2.10.4. Authorized Weapons and Ammunition for Turkey Hunting.
 a. Shotguns .410 gauge through 10 gauge bore, shot sizes are IAW Virginia DWR regulations.
 b. Bows and crossbows with broad heads are permitted IAW Virginia DWR regulations. Broad heads may be fixed blade or mechanical.
- 2.10.5. Unauthorized Weapons and Ammunition in Possession while Hunting:
 - a. All centerfire and rim-fire rifles.
 - b. Buckshot.
 - c. Lead shot shells while hunting migratory waterfowl.
 - d. Pistols, revolvers; muzzleloading pistols.
 - e. Fully automatic weapons.
 - f. Slingbows, arrowguns, and airbows.

2.11. Safety Regulations

2.11.1. Archery hunters must be a minimum of 100 yards from any permanent or moveable structure or occupied facility and 50 yards from any paved road unless "placed" by 733d CES during management hunts.

2.11.2. Firearm hunters must be a minimum of 200 yards from any permanent or moveable structure or occupied facility and 100 yards from any paved road unless "placed" by 733d CES during management hunts.

2.11.3. Entry into any "Restricted Areas" is prohibited. Appendix B shows the Fort Eustis restricted areas". All personnel are required to acknowledge these permanent "Restricted Areas". Other areas maybe temporarily off limits. Hunters are required to remain within the Hunt Area they are checked into at all times unless granted permission from Range Operations.

Chapter 3

FISHING

3.1. Lawful Fishing. Fishing shall be by hook and line or rod and reel. A landing net may be used to land fish.

3.2. Fishing Permit. Individuals aged 16 and older shall possess a current State of Virginia Saltwater and/or Freshwater Fishing License in addition to a JBLE-E Fishing Permit. JBLE-E Fishing Permits must be obtained through iSportsman.

3.2.1. Participants who are renting a 733d Force Support Squadron (FSS) Morale Wellness and Recreation (MWR) cabin, dry (tent) camping site, or boat are exempt from JBLE-E fishing permits during their rental agreement. They must possess a valid Virginia Fishing License(s).

3.2.2. Participants of MWR Golf Course fishing events are exempt from JBLE-E fishing permits. Golf Course sanctioned fishing events are coordinated in advance through 733d CES and are the responsibility of 733d FSS MWR. Participants must possess a valid Virginia Fishing License.

3.3. General Fishing Regulations. Persons authorized to fish shall comply with the provisions of this instruction and adhere to all Federal, State, and local laws and regulations, JBLE-E INRMP, DoD, AF, and installation regulations governing fishing.

3.3.1. Fishing of any type is not permitted when the installation is closed by order of the Installation Commander.

3.3.2. Fishing tackle and lines must be attended. Fishermen must remain within the general area and within line of sight of their fishing tackle.

3.3.3. Cleaning/filleting of fish on the installation is prohibited except at approved fish cleaning locations. A fish cleaning station is provided on the pier adjacent to the Warwick River boat launch for the purpose of cleaning fish.

3.4. Freshwater Fishing Regulations. Freshwater fishing locations are indicated on the iSportsman Fishing Map. Freshwater fishing at JBLE-E is strictly catch and release only.

3.4.1. Fish may be caught and released by hook and line only. Each line shall contain no more than two hooks per line. This limit does not apply to artificial lures.

3.4.2. Personal floatation devices are required to be worn by persons under the age of 13 while fishing from boats at Fort Eustis. Personal floatation device use and storage must be IAW United States Coast Guard regulation.

3.4.3. Any activity that may disturb lake-bottom sediment or shoreline is prohibited such as using waders, float tubes, or gasoline powered motors.

3.4.4. Using any bait, live or deceased, that has been captured from within Installation waters is prohibited.

3.5. Saltwater Fishing Regulations. Saltwater fishing is allowed in areas as indicated on the iSportsman fishing map. Daily creel and size limits are IAW Federal and State Regulations.

3.5.1. Personal floatation devices are required to be worn by persons under the age of 13 while fishing from the Warwick River pier.

3.5.2. Use of live, deceased, and captured bait IAW with State and Federal regulations. Live bait may be harvested from the James and Warwick Rivers. Live bait collection from within the installation creeks or freshwater lakes is prohibited.

Chapter 4

BOATING

4.1. Lawful Boating. Boats and watercraft may be launched only from designated launch locations as indicated in iSportsman Boating map.

4.1.1. All boaters using motorized watercraft shall carry on their vessel proof of completion of a State approved Boating Safety Education Course and valid boat registration in accordance with Virginia State regulations.

4.1.2. Recreational boaters and fishermen launching from James and Warwick River launch sites are permitted to launch and recover from these locations but are not authorized to enter the restricted areas defined by 33 CFR § 334.280 (Appendix B) and depicted on the iSportsman Boating Map. Boaters launching from Training Area 20 small watercraft launch site proceed directly south and avoid the James River Reserve Fleet Facility and the Military Vessel Training Area. Recreational boaters are prohibited from entering restricted areas as defined in 33 CFR § 334.280.

4.1.3. Trailered boats must be launched from areas identified on the iSportsman boating map.

4.2. Boating Permit. The individual responsible for the watercraft must obtain a JBLE-E boating permit and must check-in and check-out through the iSportsman portal.

4.3. General Boating Regulations. Persons authorized to boat shall comply with the provisions of this instruction and adhere to all Federal, State, and local laws and regulations, JBLE-E INRMP, DoD, AF, and installation regulations governing boating. Boating safety and regulation is IAW Virginia DWR and U.S. Coast Guard regulations. Some helpful links and additional information is located on the iSportsman home page.

4.3.1. Boating of any type is not permitted when the installation is closed by order of the Installation Commander.

4.3.2. Personal floatation devices are required to be worn by persons under the age of 13 while boating at Fort Eustis. Personal floatation device use and storage must be IAW United States Coast Guard regulation.

4.3.3. Paddleboards are not permitted in freshwater locations on JBLE-E.

4.3.4. The operator of the watercraft should consult nautical maps and navigational aids prior to boating and be familiar with local water hazards (tides, obstructions, visibility, etc) before operating a watercraft at JBLE-E.

4.3.5 Boaters shall designate an emergency POC who will initiate emergency response procedures within pre-arranged return time from boating in accordance with the iSportsman boater acknowledgement.

Chapter 5

DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

5.1. 733d MSG/CC

5.1.1. On 28 Sep 20, 633d ABW/CC delegated approval for all change requests and decisions for JBLE 32-102 on Fort Eustis-only to the 733d Mission Support Group Commander. The approval for the JBLE-Langley Hunting, Fishing and Boating Program remain the responsibility of the 633d ABW/CC.

5.2. 733d CES Director

5.2.1. Uses available information from the 733d CES program manager, CLEO and 733d SFS to determine if reinstatement of suspended or revoked privileges are necessary.

5.3. 733d CES Natural Resources and IPM Team

5.3.1. Serves as Program Manager of the Hunting, Fishing, and Boating Program. The Wildlife Biologist, Natural Resources Manager, or any individual assigned to the Environmental Element typically serves this role.

5.3.2. Develops, coordinates and staffs written installation policy documents for Hunting, Fishing, and Boating Program activities to include but not limited to JBLE I 32-102, the INRMP and Annual INRMP Review Summaries.

5.3.3. Prepares Environmental Impact Assessment Process (EIAP) documentation for applicable program activities.

5.3.4. Sets harvest regulations and hunting season parameters.

5.3.5. Sets limits and restrictions on game and other wildlife and natural resource harvests, collections, and use.

5.3.6. Establishes hunting and off-limits areas and requests 633d Air Base Wing (ABW) Commander approval.

5.3.7. Establishes archery, air rifle, black powder, and shotgun use locations and boundaries.

5.3.8. Develops and produces maps depicting all boundaries and limitations to recreating.

5.3.9. Maintains the Hunting, Fishing, and Boating Program in iSportsman at JBLE.isportsman.net.

5.3.10. Develops, staffs, and executes special management programs for restricted and offlimits areas including the impact area, golf course, and cantonment areas.

5.3.11. Collects, analyses, and compiles reports using biological, harvest, and participation data.

5.3.12. Conducts end of season After Action Review briefing to 733d CES and MSG leadership.

5.4. 633d ABW Safety Office

5.4.1. Reviews all safety related aspects of the Hunting, Fishing, and Boating Program.

5.5. USFWS Conservation Law Enforcement Office

5.5.1. Enforces Federal, State and Local laws, rules and regulations and installation policies that govern conservation to protect wildlife and the environment.

5.5.2. Protects natural resources through a combination of enforcement, education, and conservation programs.

5.5.3. Conducts surveillance activities as part of investigatory actions. Conducts participant compliance checks.

5.5.4. Notifies the program manager of participants who are under investigation so that those accounts may be placed on administrative hold until a resolution is reached.

5.5.5. Investigates conservation related violations and activities (natural and cultural resources).

5.5.6. Prepares reports, issues citations/summons and information packages for administrative and prosecution actions.

5.5.7. Recommends suspensions and revocations for illegal and unsafe activities to the Program Manager.

5.6. 733d SFS

5.6.1. Serves as the primary enforcement agency for all violations that are not conservation related. Provides USFWS CLEOs Installation policy/regulation and may request CLEO assistance as necessary.

5.6.2. Assists CLEOs in investigations and emergency response situations as requested. Provides crowd, traffic, bystander, and investigation scene control as requested.

5.6.3. Provides communication and reporting requirements to CLEOs and reviews the Conservation Law Enforcement Program Operating Procedures and other jurisdictional memorandums.

5.6.4. Coordinates installation law enforcement policies with USFWS CLEOs. May request USFWS CLEO assistance as necessary.

5.6.5. Liaison between USFWS CLEO and installation Office of the Staff Judge Advocate and Special Assistance to the US Attorney for legal actions, requirements, or cases/CVB issued on Fort Eustis.

5.7. 733d CEF

5.7.1. Serves as the primary response agency for search/rescue and participant recovery during emergency situations.

5.7.2. Investigates and secures UXO encounters as reported or discovered by program participants, CLEOs, or program managers.

5.8. ASA

5.8.1. Maximizes opportunities for hunting, fishing, and boating in training areas to the extent practical and consistent with training and safety requirements.

5.8.2. Reserves and provides range bulletins to 733d CES on 7-day intervals.

5.9. 633d SJA

5.9.1. Provides legal sufficiency review of the hunting, fishing, and boating programs.

Chapter 6

VIOLATION PENALTIES

6.1. Violations

6.1.1. Violators of Federal and State conservation laws are subject to prosecution before the U.S. Magistrate or Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ). Any actions taken by the magistrate or by commanders under the UCMJ are in addition to the administrative suspension or revocation of hunting, fishing, and boating privileges.

6.1.2. The733d CES program manager has the authority to suspend or revoke privileges for violating this regulation, AF regulations, installation policies, INRMP, and federal and state laws. The Program Manager will officially notify, in writing, persons whose privileges have been suspended or revoked using the iSportsman Portal notification process. Persons whose privileges have been suspended must request reinstatement in writing to the 733d CES Director at the end of the suspension period. Persons whose privileges have been revoked, may apply in writing to the 733d CES Director's office for reinstatement after two (2) years from date of revocation.

6.1.3. The Program Manager considers those in violation of fish/game laws or regulations (i.e.: shooting before legal light, illegal possession, fishing out of season, etc) for suspension or revocation of privileges, in addition to federal, state, local, and installation policy punitive actions. All individuals considered for suspension or revocation shall be placed on administrative hold (unable to checkin/out) until the investigation has been completed. Suspension and revocation actions are described in Table 1.

6.1.4. The iSportsman program automatically places any recreationalist in an administrative hold status who fails to follow program set requirements. For example, failing to check out by required times will results in an administrative hold status following the expiration of internal grace period. Administrative holds will be 7 days from date of infraction for the first three (3) offenses. A fourth (4th) administrative infraction will place the account on administrative hold for the remainder of the calendar year unless unlocked at the discretion of the 733d CES or CLEO. After the fifth (5th) offense within one calendar year, the participant will be suspended from all privileges for the remainder of that calendar year.

6.2. General Categories

6.2.1. Penalties for violations of Federal, State, and Local laws are set by the appropriate governing agencies and are prescribed by appropriate judicial platforms.

6.2.2. Penalties for violations of installation policies are prescribed by federal statutes and determined by appropriate judicial platforms.

6.2.3. Penalties for violations of specific installation regulations not covered by federal statutes may result in suspension or revocation of privileges based on categorical classification of the offense.

6.2.3.1. Penalties for violations of Fort Eustis specific regulations may result in loss of privileges. Table 1, Penalties for Offenses Related to JBLE 32-102, lists the general descriptions of Fort Eustis offenses (i.e., not regulated by state or federal law) and the associated penalties.

6.2.3.2. Situations with multiple violations of either category may result in suspension or revocation of privileges on first offense, for example, not using a safety harness and not wearing blaze orange, and failure to sign in properly (this example constitutes two safety violations and one administrative violation that may result in suspension or revocation of privileges).

Terms

Animal: Includes wildlife as defined below (such as deer, other mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians), as well as insects and other invertebrate organisms.

Artifact: An object of cultural significance.

Engaging: To become involved in.

Exterior Waterfowl Blinds: Waterfowl blinds that are located within 100 yards of the outmost boundary of the installation along the James and Warwick River or designated within a safe distance from areas that under normal circumstances could be occupied by humans.

Fauna: Includes any wild animal including game wildlife, non-game wildlife and invertebrate organisms.

Inaccessible: Unable to be reached, not within reach of the driver under normal driving operations.

Interior Waterfowl Blinds or Areas: Waterfowl blinds or areas that are located more than 100 yards inward of the outmost boundary of the installation.

Jump shooting: The act of stalking with intent to take, sneaking up on, or flushing game from land or water.

Night Hunting: Hunting between the hours of 30 minutes past sunset and 30 minutes before sunrise.

Natural Resources: All native wildlife and flora to include plants (including trees, herbaceous plants, other native plants), forestry products (timber, kindling/tree parts, pine straw), habitats soils, minerals, water, wetlands and land.

Pesticide: "Any substance or mixture of substances including biological control agents, that may prevent, destroy, repel, or mitigate pests and is specifically labeled for use by the EPA. Pesticides include but are not limited to acaricides, algaecides, fungicides, herbicides, insecticides, nematicides and rodenticides.

Processing facility: A roofed structure located in the 3500 block south of The Pines Golf Course behind building 3516 where deer processing is authorized, and deer biological data is collected.

Revocation: Permanent forfeiture of an individual's privileges on the installation.

Secure: Placed so not to be moved or taken.

Senior: Person 65 years of age and over.

Suspension: Forfeiture of an individual's privileges on the installation for a prescribed period of time.

Take: To harass, harm, pursue, hunt, shoot, wound, kill, trap, capture, or collect or to attempt to engage in any such conduct

Taking: Capture or gain possession of.

Youth: Person 15 years of age and under.

Wildlife: Animals that have not been domesticated or tamed and are usually living in a natural environment, including both game and non-game species.
